

## **The Weekly Activity Report for March 3 - 7, 2025**

As a result of the high winds at the beginning of the week, we had to make several facility repairs and remove trees that had been damaged. A portion of the roof at the Maintenance Facility had to be repaired. A portion of trim was blown off the roof of the Police Department, and the Fire Department assisted with power lines that were blown down or damaged. The entire county was under a Critical Fire Condition Notice due to the high winds and dry vegetation.

Building Inspections completed eighteen (18) inspections and permit reviews during the week.

The Distribution and Collection Crew responded to twenty-eight (28) calls for service for either water or sewer issues. They also repaired two water main breaks in different areas of town.

We received a delivery of aviation fuel at the airport. Usage of the airport and runway continues to increase each year. We consistently have the lowest fuel price of all surrounding airports. I met briefly with a company that is getting us an estimate to seal-coat the runway in order to make it last longer.

We had thirty-nine (39) visitors to the Twin Lakes Activity Center, in addition to approximately three-hundred (300) FFA students that used the facility for a judging contest.

In addition to trimming trees and prepping the soccer fields, Parks and Recreation delivered eight (8) trash trailers. Our next Free Dump Day is scheduled for March 15th.

We received our first vendor application for TNT Fest, which is always held the last weekend in June.

Officer Moody received an award from JISD in recognition for the impaired/distracted driving program that he presented last year to high school seniors.

I attended a Mental Health meeting with Judge Umphress and representatives from Faith Community Hospital Rehab, Mayhill Hospital and the Helen Ferabee Center. The focus of the meeting was to review procedures for law enforcement and health officials in the event that they need to take an individual to a facility to obtain mental health treatment.

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality received complaints from the community regarding the odor in our water system. A TCEQ inspector came today and inspected the Water Treatment Plant and the distribution system. The inspector did not find any violations and stated that we were taking the appropriate steps to resolve the issue. The last two days we have not noticed any odor in the water as it leaves the treatment plant. We anticipate it will take at least another day for all the water in the distribution system to be replaced and the odor will dissipate.

The next regularly scheduled City Council Meeting is Monday, March 10th.
